Island Seeks New Approach to Tourism

The Flinders Council has made a bold decision to work towards a whole new approach to tourism for Flinders Island.

Supported by the State Government, the Council has engaged 'Designing Tourism' Co-Directors, Dr Dianne Dredge and Sarah Lebski to work with the local community in finding an appropriate balance between the impact of visitors, the Island's social and economic challenges and the need to protect the Island lifestyle.

'The Islander Way' is a two-year project based on the principles of regenerative tourism. As such, the project will chart a pathway for tourism that respects the community's values, contributes to a resilient economy and takes responsibility for the impact of tourism on the natural environment.

The project adopts an innovative community-led approach. According to Dr Dredge, regenerative tourism ensures that 'tourism is done with the community, not to the community, which has been the traditional way forward'.

Chair of Visit Northern Tasmania, Paul Seaman said that his organisation is very pleased to support the project. 'We were aware that the Island community was feeling conflicted about an increasing number of visitors. This concern has been highlighted particularly during COVID-19 when the Island's popularity has grown; often beyond some of the services and amenities that the community is able to provide'.

'The Islander Way' will include a visitor economy business support program enabling local entrepreneurs to develop businesses that build deeper connections between visitors and the Island's rich history and culture.

'The Islander Way' was launched at a community gathering on Flinders Island earlier this month. It is understood to be the first project of its kind in Australia, and is already attracting national and international interest from tourism professionals and academic institutions.

Designing Tourism

Designing Tourism is Launceston-based enterprise, co-founded by Dr Dianne Dredge and Sarah Lebski. The company is committed to the principles and practices of regenerative tourism, where tourism is a catalyst for flourishing communities and a thriving natural environment.
